Creative Corner: Jackie's Crafty Holiday Wreath

DIY Ornament Wreath

The holiday season is the perfect time to try your hand at being crafty.

Here is an easy DIY wreath that will give your front door a festive look!

Supplies you'll need:

- Wire hanger
- Hot glue gun
- Ornaments
- Pliers



Step 1:

Bend your hanger into a circle (try to get as close to a circle as you can)

Step 2:

Untwist the wire at the top

Step 3:

String your ornaments one by one

Step 4:

Push your ornaments together as close as you can so that the wire doesn't show through

Step 5:

When you have strung all your ornaments on, use your pliers to twist the hanger back together.

Helpful tips:

Hot glue each cap of the ornaments if they are not as sturdy to prevent them from falling off.

Use a bow or another decoration of your choice to cover the hook.

Finally, hang wreath, step back and admire!
